

go to to get the information, he knows ultimately there is a complete system so that when somebody is found dead with knives in them or under strange circumstances that there is from the very beginning an adequate inquiry so that any answers given as to why that person died, how they died will be to the degree humanly possible and economically possible will be honest and accurate. So, I would urge you to adopt the amendments. I look and I see that I have used up my time. I have given you a brief overview of how the amendments arose, how the study arose and I would give you one final piece of information. I hereby make available to all members of the legislature the entire files of the LR 154 committee that to this time had been kept essentially secret and in vaults. The reason for that was because the matter was in litigation, there is an awful lot of information members of this legislature should read and learn about so that they have a better understanding. So that they have a better appreciation of the difficulty of law enforcement, of the benefits of good law enforcement and some of the devastating problems of poor law enforcement or a poor system for law enforcement to work within. Move adoption of the amendments.

PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Maresh.

SENATOR MARESH: Mr. President, a question of Senator DeCamp. Senator DeCamp, your amendment still allows for three district coroners, correct?

SENATOR DeCAMP: Pardon?

SENATOR MARESH: Your amendments do not remove the provision of having three district coroners?

SENATOR DeCAMP: Have you had an opportunity to read what is in the Journal there from 217 on....

SENATOR MARESH: They are still mentioning that a district coroner shall be as in Section 5, I believe it says, referring to Section 5 and that is where we have district coroners.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Okay, you would have the state as I understand it, in talking to the county attorneys, you would have the state broken up into four districts. You would have a chief medical examiner probably based here in Lincoln operating probably using the state patrol lab or whatever there, and he would have deputies so that in a case of murder or whatever out in lets say Scottsbluff, you wouldn't have to fly him out, you would have somebody appointed in that district and he could be involved in that. Now your question I suspect next is well is there some way to do it more economically?
