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Legislature and the staff of the Legislature and also we consider the input from the public through the public hearings to provide information upon which sound decisions can be made. So let's not sort out one segment for special consideration. There may be, in fact, a real danger in setting a precedent such as this. I urge you to support the kill motion.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, Senator Haberman and I were just having a brief little discussion and he may consider, he didn't say that he would, but he may consider withdrawing his kill motion and he should I think allow the bill to go ahead and progress since so much work has gone into it, since most of the members do seem to understand it, and if his only reason for offering the kill motion is because he does not understand it, that is a problem which he can correct through individual application and study. This is a proposition I think in this bill which should be given the opportunity to work and I would ask that Senator Haberman consider withdrawing his kill motion and that he not describe this particular bill in terms of sides. I have not heard or noticed on the discussion of this bill a hard line drawn where you can say there are people on this side who call themselves conservatives and by virtue of that title, they are opposed to this bill. That, I feel, in this case would be an oversimplification and I have not detected it. I do realize that there are certain members of the Legislature who call themselves conservatives and they will oppose anything that you could label human uplift legislation but still, to say that those individuals represent the "conservative" position would be unfair to people who are conservative with reference to some things but they do have compassion. So the first thing I would ask the members to do is ignore what Senator Haberman said in trying to characterize this as an issue divided along sides, conservatives and then he said Senator Johnson. Secondly, I hope the rest of you, because a senator says he does not understand what has happened, will not place his limitations upon yourselves. I would be willing to work with Senator Haberman to help him come to an understanding of what this bill does. I am opposed to his kill motion and I hope it will be voted down.
