PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator DeCamp. Senator DeCamp. Question. All right, Senator DeCamp says, "question." Do I see five hands? I do. All those in favor of ceasing debate vote aye, opposed nay. Record the vote.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Motion carried. Debate ceases. Senator Haberman, you may close on your motion to indefinitely postpone.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, Senator Chambers, I am absolutely surprised at you. I never mentioned withdrawing this bill. I am surprised that you would stand up on the floor and say that I did. I asked you, Senator Chambers, did you fully understand the bill and what did it mean? And you said, yes, that it attempts to raise the standard of income for the poor and I said, well, Senator Chambers, there is a difference between the people in Omaha and the people in Imperial. I said, why can't this be done by interim study by the Legislature. No, he said, that won't work, that won't work. I said, well then let's have it done by the Executive Board. Let's have the Executive Board hire somebody to do this study. No, he said, we don't want the Executive Board to do it either. He said and the Welfare Department won't do it. So I just wanted to clear the air to this body. I have no intention of withdrawing my kill motion and I, too, believe that Senator Johnson doesn't care who makes the study or how much it costs, it is the rest of the bill. So I suggest we kill this and introduce a resolution to have a study and give Senator Johnson some money to do a study but let's leave the rest of it alone. Let's don't go as far as the bill goes. So I ask your support to indefinitely postpone LB 35.

PRESIDENT: For what purpose...he was closing, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: May I have a point of personal privilege, Mr. Chairman?

PRESIDENT: Well he was making many statements about Senator Chambers in his statement so, Senator Haberman, were you in effect, asking questions of Senator Chambers?
