Yes, that is what I said, it is very serious. Senator Kahle is smiling. Senator Kahle, you probably don't know that I am aware of some of the senators who make racial statements and jokes around here, do you? But I know, because some of his buddies come back and tell me. So, we are doing what Senator Lewis mentioned one time, we are playing hardball. There are forty-eight white people but there are some who have different attitudes than others in this body, and when we deal with crucial issues that cause certain votes to be placed in here, people are embarrassed to deal with that issue, and want to act as though it is not a part of the consideration. All the resolution says that was drafted in New Mexico and given to Senator Haberman, or wherever it was drafted, that the people in Washington D.C. are unfit to vote, that they are the kind of people who are considered unworthy by these democrats with small people who talk about the right of representation and right of people who have something to say about their government. But what I was going to tell you about a development in Washington D.C., they are starting to build condominiums. They are starting to push the poor black people out. They call it urban renewal and other terms and they are building the types of structures which go for such a large amount of money that the black people can no longer afford them, so pretty soon Washington D.C. is going to be a white city. There will be a few of us around there shining shoes, sweeping the floors, taking care of white people's babies, washing their clothes, things that my mother did when I was a child. Would it surprise you to know that Steve Rosenblatt, who is the President of Omaha City Council, was reared partially by my mother, and the same with Tim Rouse, who is a member of the City Council? We know the role that black people are allowed to have, while being unfit to vote we are fit enough to raise your children and to raise your leaders. So I had to speak to get the opportunity to put some of these things into the record, and those of you who shake your head, you can like it or lump it. I am going to say what I have got to say like you do what you do. And I will tell you, I think it would be unfair to have two black people in the Senate of the United States.
