SENATOR LEWIS: But you can't in Omaha and you can't in Lincoln. That makes a lot of sense based on arguments we just heard here. Well, Mr. President, I think that now is the time that we probably get right down to it that we need some kind of uniformity and there is nothing wrong with this and the arguments about moving out of the city or moving in are not particularly germane and I'd support the Newell amendment and subsequently the bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Keyes, your light is on. There you are. Your light is shining.

SENATOR KEYES: Mr. Speaker, just for the benefit of my good friend Senator Newell and Alden Aust in Omaha, and Alden Aust is the man that is back of this bill, I received a letter this last week inviting me down to Florida to engage in a conversation down there on the valuation of land surrounding cities. It seems that the people who live in the town want to zone and regulate and tell you what you can do with your land that surrounds the cities. In Omana it is up to three miles. You know, all we want to do is let you know that there is a policy aboard and it is going to come to light and it will force the cities, if they condemn my property and say that I have only limited use of it, that I can only sell it for certain things, there is a plan crawling across the United States that will say that the subdivision of government that controls the development of that land will have to pay to the owner of that land the difference between what he can get for it and what they are willing to let him sell it for. I want you to think very strongly on what you are going to do here today when you let somebody in town, somebody who has absolutely no control over my farm tell me what I can do with it, that I can't develop it to its highest potential. You will be paying the extra money for it in a very short time, let me tell you that.
