So consequently, I would oppose the studded horseshoe amendment. Now if Senator Haberman felt that he could support this bill with this amendment, I would accept the amendment. Senator Haberman, one last chance.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. Chairman, I will remove the amendment because I don't think it will pass without Senator Newell's support. Thank you.

SENATOR CLARK: The amendment is withdrawn.
