

further amendment and a change to Section 2 of the bill constitutes that technical amendment. So I would move the adoption of the amendment, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Marsh, do you wish to speak to the Beutler amendment?

SENATOR MARSH: Yes, Mr. Speaker, I do. I have a question for Senator Beutler. With the proposed changes you are making, do you feel that then 306 would not grant a different right to creditors or claimants after the death of the decedent than such creditors or claimants would have had prior to the death of the decedent?

SENATOR BEUTLER: That is right. In the context of our discussion, the context of the floor debate the last time around, in my interpretation of what senators meant by that sentence, the answer to that is yes.

SENATOR MARSH: Thank you very much.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Landis. Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DE CAMP: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I will probably get hung and massacred when I walk out or meet some friends tonight. I have supported this bill. I am now going to oppose the bill. I am going to oppose it as vigorously as I can but I would go back to the beginning and I would remind Senator Beutler and Senator Landis who are the sponsors of the bill of what I said when I first talked on this bill and I talked on it once. I said, I believe you are doing completely different than you are saying. I can get the testimony and debate out. I said I believe you are creating a completely different right, a completely different system. I said I believe there is no other place anywhere in the United States where you can show me that I, a person not involved in any way, can be made personally liable, personally liable for something I had no participation, involvement or anything in. Let us clear up one thing. It is not the property that is liable. It is not the land that the person had an interest in. It is another individual, not necessarily a spouse, a wife or anything else. I claim and claimed then that if I was wrong I would stand up here, apologize, support the bill, bend on my knees and do everything else, but if I was right I thought they had an obligation to kind of drop the bill. By this time you have had opportunity to read the Journal and read the Attorney General's opinion. I will read you some excerpts from this five or six page opinion.
