SENATOR HABERMAN: I asked if you....

SENATOR LANDIS: I know...I understand the question and I am really reflecting on it. No, I would not...I am not sure that I would support LB 605.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Thank you. Senator Hoagland, would you just define disorderly conduct?

SENATOR HOAGLAND: We have attempted to find a definition in the statutes of disorderly conduct, Senator Haberman, and evidently it was repealed when the new criminal code went into effect, but there is a definition of disturbing the peace contained in Section 28-1322. So what we would suggest at this time...

SENATOR HABERMAN: All right.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: ...is that you simply use that definition for your statute.

SENATOR HABERMAN: I will accept that. You go ahead and put that amendment in and I will ask for your support.

SENATOR CLARK PRESIDING

SENATOR CLARK: Is there any future...any more debate, on the Landis-Hoagland amendment? Senator Haberman, do you want to talk?

SENATOR HABERMAN: Would you please read what we are talking about?

SENATOR CLARK: The Clerk will read the amendment.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Hoagland and Landis move to amend the committee amendments by striking Section 1.

SENATOR HABERMAN: No, that is fine with me. I will go along with that amendment.

SENATOR CLARK: Is there any further debate? If not, Senator Landis or Senator Hoagland, do you wish to close?

SENATOR HOAGLAND: I think we can waive closing, Mr. President.

SENATOR CLARK: The question before the House is the adoption of the Landis and Hoagland amendment. All those in favor vote aye. All those opposed vote no. This is an amendment
