fifty feet from a Hinky Dinky store, about six hundred feet from St. Mary's church and school, approximately six hundred feet from Christie Heights Park and near the vicinity. These are some of the places that would be affected by it: The South Omaha Technical Community College, just a matter of maybe two or three blocks from there, the United Parcel Service who is highly objecting to the rendering plant, there is three or four private schools and churches, there are about four or five elementary schools that would be within the vicinity. Now I have passed out a general map of the area of the Canada plant and the comments made by some of the residents of this small community and Senator DeCamp was surprised to find out that we have a Father DeCamp in Canada. As you will notice from the comments made by these people there was a definite odor associated with this type of rendering plant. I have also many letters, copies of the reactions from the people that made the trip to Canada. One letter in particular says, from a lady who does not even live in the area, "I feel sorry for the residents of South Omaha and the business people for having to put up with the odors. They have at present and I feel it would be definitely a detriment." Some of the businesses that have voiced their opposition is Buffalo Machinery, Omaha Vaccine, Petersen and Michelsen, the Shop, Stoysich Sausage, Stockyards Vet School, Big Joe Businesses, Hillside Bar, A & W Pro Hardware, the list goes on and on. I don't want to take up too much time. I think you know what I am getting at and you probably read the controversy that we have in the daily World Herald where the people have gone down two, three hundred at a time. They have presented the city council with more than five thousand signatures of the residential area objecting to the rendering plant. I would like to end by saying, with Earth Day quickly approaching in its attempt to heighten the awareness of the environmental aspects of our lives and in light of the position this Legislature has taken in regard to clean air laws passed in previous years, it is my hope that the members of this Legislature will vote for the adoption of this amendment. Thank you.
