these young people but I will do the best I can. From Senator Lamb's district there were 14 students, seventh and ninth grade from Merna-Anselmo Public Schools with two chaperones. Are you still there? Okay, welcome to the Unicameral. From Senator Beutler's district, 22 sixth grade students, St. Mary's School, Lincoln, Nebraska, Mr. Richard Jenkinson, the teacher. Are you still up there? Okay. From Senator Sieck's district, 5 juniors and sophomores, McCool High School, McCool, Nebraska, and they are representing themselves. Where are you? From McCool. Okay. From Senator Hefner's district, 27 students, sixth to eighth grades from the Immanuel Lutheran School at Osmond, Nebraska, and the Zion Lutheran School from Plainview, Nebraska, and they have two teachers accompanying them. Where are you? Okay. We've still got one more. From Senator Marsh's district, 38 preschool students from Lollipop Farm, Lincoln, Nebraska, and one, two, three, four, five teachers. Where are you located? Where are the lollipops located? Okay. And from Senator Lamb's district 20 students and 10 adults, preschool to seventh grade from Anselmo, Nebraska. Where are you located? Okay. Clerk, record the vote.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 2 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance the bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is carried and 782 is advanced to E & R for review. The next bill is 936.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 936 was introduced by Senator William Barrett. (Read title.) The bill was read on January 23, referred to Judiciary, advanced to General File. There are no amendments, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The Chair recognizes Senator Barrett.

SENATOR BARRETT: Mr. Speaker and members, LB 936 is a bill which will essentially simplify the procedure of granting a license to a new resident of Nebraska when such new resident held a real estate license in his or her state prior to relocating in Nebraska. A very quick example, look at the Omaha-Council Bluffs situation at the present time which is essentially considered to be one trade area. There is a reciprocal agreement now between Iowa and Nebraska. It is all right, legal for real estate people to cross the line from Iowa into Nebraska and do business in the Omaha area. If such resident moved from Iowa, relocated in Omaha, that person although he or she may have been doing business in Nebraska or in Omaha for some twenty years, under the existing law, that person would have to sit for the Nebraska real estate examination. They have to start
