PRESIDENT: Before we get to the next speaker, the Chair would like to introduce some of Senator Warner's guests, some 58 students from the Seventh grade from Ashland Public Schools, with their Social Studies teacher, Mr. Mike Lowry. They are up here in the North balcony. Would they stand up and be recognized? Welcome to the Legislature. And Senator Newell also has as a guest over here in the South balcony, Mr. Jim Beutel, from the Omaha Public School Board member. He is Chairman of the Northwest Omaha Resident Association, Chairman, Board of Trustees, Brotherhood of Railway Clerks. He is over here under the South balcony. Welcome! The Chair recognizes Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman, and members of the Legislature, like Senator Simon, I think there is a reason to have grave concern about the safety of people who participate in boxing. For those people who enjoy watching it as fans and those who will participate, you know, wherever you participate just for the fun of it, boxing can be something that is exhilarating, I imagine, exciting, and all of the other things that are connected with the macho spirit in this country. Nevertheless, the individuals who participate are often viewed only as means of providing entertainment for others or moneymaking property. They are not viewed as human beings. I know a lot of boxers personally. Some of them are very capable, others not so. I know one young man who was able to take a tremendous amount of punishment, more than was good for him. He was not knocked out until late in his career, but he walks on his heels. He has scar tissue over both eyes. His face is distorted from the number of punches that he has absorbed and I know that Senator Simon's amendment will not necessarily prevent all of these types of things occurring to an individual, but nevertheless, injuries which could result from a latent condition that perhaps a physician would detect but not necessarily an assistant
