

personal property from one place to another and don't take the trailer back, they don't know where that trailer is. If it can be used in this light, then they could perhaps call the police department and say we have lost a trailer with license number so and so and the police authorities across the nation have a very good communication system where this can be at least found and the purpose of doing this is so they can get their property back. They are not so much interested in getting somebody fined but in helping get their material back. I move for the adoption of this amendment.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the adoption of the committee amendment number two to 696. All those in favor vote aye, opposed no. We are voting on the adoption of the committee amendments number two. Record.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 2 nays on adoption of the Judiciary Committee amendments, labelled as number three actually.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay, we are now ready for discussion on committee amendments number four, Senator Nichol.

SENATOR NICHOL: I thought we were on three.

CLERK: Well, four as labelled in the Journal, Senator.

SENATOR NICHOL: Okay, very good. The next amendment, Mr. Chairman, I would like the Legislature to consider is Request # 2143 if you are following in your bill book which is listed as number five on page 924 of the Legislative Journal. This is one of the amendments which the Judiciary Committee considered at public hearing dealing with the amendment of current drug laws. In order to help you better visualize the effect that the committee drug amendments have on the current law, I have provided you with a handout as I stated before which outlines the effect of the present law of Request 2143, Request #2142 and as the amendments interact, a graph allowing the total effect that the combination of Request #2142 and 2143 would have on existing law. The intent behind 2143 is this. The Judiciary Committee proposes to establish a new category of drugs within the current drug schedule called "exceptionally hazardous drugs". The committee amendments define "exceptionally hazardous drugs" as any narcotic, angel dust, or phencyclidine, dide, and the three most highly abused barbituals, amobarbitals, secobarbital and pentobarbital. These drugs are currently found in the controlled substances act but in different drug Schedules. The
