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and leave the law the way it is, which is the safest thing to do under the circumstances, and then with respect to section 21 we are taking out one of the changes in 21, and that change is found on page 28, lines 20 and 21. So you see, Speaker Marvel, what this...this bill is a product of an enormous amount of work over the last fourteen months. A lot of people have pitched in to make the Sunshine Act work better...work better for everybody, particularly candidates, and as I indicated, some of those are necessary, some of them are merely good, but all of them are noncontroversial and there is no reason we can't pass all those across right now.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Well, let me ask one more question, if I may, Mr. President. That is, those people who are candidates at the moment and have been following the law religiously, now what...are they in jeopardy if this bill passes? Or in jeopardy or their supporters or their officers will be thoroughly confused by the changes?

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Absolutely not, Mr. Speaker, but if there is any question about that, if there is any concern about that, let's make this go into effect after the elections are over. Let's make it go into effect January 1st.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Well, I am concerned with most of the candidates who certainly have sincere people who I assume would be confused with some of the general language that is being used about probably necessary and good. I don't know what those words mean when you are talking about serious legislation. You have said, and let me repeat, that those who are candidates at the moment are not in jeopardy as far as bookkeeping is concerned, as far as their actions are concerned by any changes in this bill. Is that correct terminology?

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Absolutely not, Mr. Speaker. They are not at all, but if there is any concern on your part that they might be, and I can understand that, let's have it go into effect January 1st, but let's not throw all this fourteen months work down the rat hole and start all over again next session. That doesn't make sense either.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Well, Senator Hoagland, I am trying to be as sincere as I can but I hope you understand that when you answer in general terminology of absolutely necessary and good and probably necessary, as far as I am concerned you confuse the bill, and that is the reason I asked the

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
