SENATOR KREMER: Okay, this is my first time for this year, but I'm going to ask for a Call of the House and a roll call vote. Lets get on with the show.

SENATOR CLARK: A Call of the House has been asked for. All those in favor of a Call of the House vote aye, those opposed vote nay. Record.

CLERK: 13 ayes, no nays to go under Call, Mr. President.

SENATOR CLARK: The House is under Call. All legislators will return to their seats. All unauthorized personnel will leave the floor. Senator Kremer, did you want a roll call? Will you all check in please. We have four excused so we are looking for twelve people. Senator Labeledz will you check in please. Senator Rumery. Senator Schmit. Senator Keyes in the room? Senator Newell will you check in please. Senator Chambers, Senator Hoagland. I'm looking for Schmit and Keyes. Senator Keyes in the room. Senator Kremer we are down to one, Senator Keyes. Do you want to go ahead with the roll call vote? Go ahead with the roll call vote. Call the roll we are only short one. Senator Keyes has gone home, he is excused so we have them all.

CLERK: Mr. President, the amendment reads as follows: (Read Kremer amendment). Roll call vote. 20 ayes, 20 nays, 5 excused and not voting. 4 present and not voting. Vote appears on page 1511 of the Legislative Journal.

SENATOR CLARK: Motion fails. Do you have anything else on the bill?

CLERK: Yes, sir, several things. Mr. President, Senator Murphy now moves to amend the bill. (Read Murphy amendment).

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Murphy.

SENATOR MURPHY: One of the interim studies this summer dealt with alcoholism and Dr. Ford who was then head of the Division of Alcoholism and is now deputy director of the Department of Institutions appeared before the committee. In the course of the discussion I specifically asked him what their program for our teenage high school children was in alcoholism. His reply, and it is a matter of record in the transcript was, "That they mailed out 80,000 pieces of literature", when I asked him if he had a formal program he said that they did not. He further indicated that part of the problem was that the high schools, the people in our schools
