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used in the past as it has been...as we have had in essence, the same problem when we have had needs greater than we have had funds to do so and we have a legislative formula for the meeting of those needs in priority. I would suggest that that formula be carried out in the same way here, that it has been done in the past.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, thank you.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Schmit, do you wish to close on your amendment? No closing? The question before the House is the adoption of the Schmit amendment as amended by the Landis amendment. All those in favor vote aye. All those opposed vote nay.

CLERK: Senator Clark voting no.

SENATOR CLARK: Have you all voted? This is the adoption of the Schmit amendment. It takes 25 votes. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Record the vote.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Whoops! Mr. President, let's have a Call of the House.

SENATOR CLARK: A Call of the House has been asked for. All those in favor of a Call of the House vote aye. All those opposed vote nay. Record the vote.

CLERK: 15 ayes, 0 nays to go under Call, Mr. President.

SENATOR CLARK: The House is under Call. All legislators will take their seats and please record in. All legislators will take their seats, please. We are under Call. Senator Newell, will you take your seat, please. We are under Call. We will take call in votes.

CLERK: Senator Lamb voting aye; Senator Maresh voting aye; Senator Simon voting aye; Senator Cope voting no; Senator Fitzgerald voting aye.

SENATOR CLARK: Record the vote.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 9 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of the Schmit amendment.

SENATOR CLARK: The Schmit amendment is adopted. Do you any more amendments?

CLERK: I've got...Senator Landis had an amendment printed, Mr. President, on page 1398 that I understand he wishes to withdraw.
