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of a Free Congress did try to influence, the only thing that they have denied is the fact that they offered Alan Jones money to pay off his campaign debts if he withdrew. He did not, and they admit that they did try to talk Alan Jones out of the race. They were trying to influence to that extent. The only question, the place there is any debate at all is over the question of offering him money to withdraw. I think that Mr. Daub was less than frank when he indicated that he did not believe that these were true comments, that he would not respond in any way in this area, and that he would not repudiate the Committee for the Survival of a Free Congress or refuse to take or accept monies for them, a group that is trying very heavily to, and admits that they are trying to influence the Congressional race in the Second Congressional district. With that, I would also like to close on this motion but Senator Simon asked me to cede some of my time to him and with that I would cede the time to Senator Simon.

PRESIDENT: Senator Simon.

SENATOR SIMON: Mr. President, members of the body, I was one of the members of the committee that voted in favor of Mr. Daub. I know Hal personally. Quite honestly and being very candid at the time that the hearing took place, the last hearing, I felt that some of the questions that Senator Newell asked might perhaps be a bit out of order. I think that it is...needed for me to try and explain to the people on the floor, and Senator Cope, just exactly what the line of reasoning I think that Senator Newell was trying to go about in portraying and asking these questions of Mr. Daub. I think what we are concerned about here is the honesty of an individual who is going to be serving on a particular board and that is what concerns me not whether or not a particular candidate is supported by the John Birch Society or by the American Nazi Party or the Communist Party or whatever party, I don't care about that Senator Cope but the honesty of the candidate. I have to confess at this time that I have some mixed reservations and I will not support the confirmation now of Mr. Daub. Now why do I say that when I have in the past? Because I pick up today's copy of the World Herald and if you could read it it would perhaps, if you had attended the hearings, perhaps it would raise some questions in your mind. It raised two in my mind which I wish to share with you this morning. Senator Newell had asked Mr. Daub if he had received any support from this particular committee, and I don't care about the committee, now let's make no bones about it. The committee is a super right wing committee, the John Birch organization which I don't. . . .
