also the specific mandate that this be used for education was rather nebulous. Now in keeping with the spirit of the amendment, in keeping with Senator Murphy's objective and in sympathy with Senator Murphy's objective, I have an amendment which specifies that up to \$75,000 will be spent by the Department of Alcoholism to develop a program and the Department of Alcoholism in my amendment you will see has a deadline for developing that, and then my amendment mandates that this specific program be delivered to the educational people and the educational people are mandated to introduce this into the educational system in the state and they have a deadline and also my amendment requires that at the end of a school period, which is specified in the amendment, that both of the departments will come back and make a report to the Legislature on the results of their program and to report to us the school systems that did not implement the program. So my amendment follows the principle, follows the wishes, and I agree with them, of Senator Murphy, that education about the disease of alcoholism in the schools is a must and it assures that this is going to happen and it puts the monkey on the department's backs that they have to do it, they have to develop a program, they have to implement it and they have to report back to us and I urge that this bill be returned for the specific amendment. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the Powers motion to return the bill. Senator Murphy.

SENATOR MURPHY: Ladies and gentlemen, I cannot in good conscience accept Senator Powers' motion. Three years ago we told these people to do this. Fifteen years ago we told the Department of Education to do this. To date, nothing. I called my superintendent of schools at home last week and I said, how much input have you had from the Nebraska Department of Alcoholism in education regarding alcoholism in your school. His two health teachers reported that they had had considerable assistance from, would you believe it, the federal government. From the state government, nothing. Now there is only one way that this Legislature can bring about compliance with the law. That is to take action under what I lovingly call Murphy's law to throw an administrator out who does not follow the law and I would recommend to the Governor that he do just that. After three years this man has pretty well established his incompetence but I not only would recommend that but I would recommend that we hang on to the only thing that they pay any attention to and that is the almighty dollar.
