SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Murphy.

SENATOR MURPHY: I would simply remind you as you were reminded this summer that the current state support of local education runs about \$140 million, that is without any of the \$20 million increments we are now discussing. In addition to that, we have raised the homestead exemption by about seven and a half million and sixty to sixty-five percent of that also will accrue to education. I think possibly we go too far. We are going to run this at this count well over \$200 million in so-called state aid, which in fact it is not. I, for one, would like to have the people back home know what their government cost. This bill in no way portends a better education, a more effective education, nor an overall reduction in the total cost of education. Accordingly I find myself wanting to go very slow in any additional increases over what we already have in place.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Maresh.

SENATOR MARESH: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, I am tempted to call for the question but I would like to speak out that this time I will vote for the override. In the past I never could support state aid to education but now we have a fair formula, all the property is revalued and I think the districts in my area are treated fairly and I can't see why I wouldn't support this. Senator Vickers said that people aren't speaking out on this and that is true. In my area people I guess are leaving it up to me to decide if we have a fair formula for the districts and they know that I support a fair formula so I would like to go on record as voting to override the veto. Somebody brought up that the issue will be placed on the ballot again. I think with the seven percent limitation on budgets that we will see this stay and that the people will not get this on the ballot because there is a lid on the local school districts spending limitation. So I hope that we can get thirty votes to override the Governor's veto.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator DeCamp. The question has been called for. Do I see five hands? All those in favor of ceasing debate vote aye, opposed vote no. Record the vote.
