has come to this body even as a newcomer giving very strong support to our friend, Senator Marsh, who for years held forth here by herself, but she has served in this body with wisdom and compassion, intelligence, and I think she has demonstrated a quality of graciousness which at least I might do better to emulate to a certain extent. I think that this body would do well to elect her as Chairman of the Constitutional Revision Committee. I think it would reflect credit upon the body and I would urge you to vote for her.

PRESIDENT: Are there any other nominations for the Chair position of Constitutional Revision and Recreation? Senator DeCamp moves to close nominations and declares Senator Labedz elected by unanimous ballot. The question before the House then is, do you want to close nominations and ucclare Senator Labedz elected by unanimous ballot? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record the vote, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 37 ayes, 0 mays on the motion to close nominations and declare Senator Labedz unanimous winner.

PRESIDENT: The motion carries and nominations are closed and Senator Labedz, you are declared elected Chairperson of the Constitutional Revision Committee. The next committee is the Education Committee. Nominations are in order for the Education Committee. The Chair recognizes Senator Barrett.
