or require intervention by the court to prevent excessive entanglement between the state and religion, based on those statements by Judge Urbom, I have no choice other than to be opposed to a motion which flies in the face of those warnings. I am saying again, I will concede that the motion is being offered in good faith, but I think it is not founded on the facts as they exist before us now in terms of what may legally or constitutionally be done with reference to a Chaplain. So I think my position will be clear from the record based on the remarks I have made, so I won't detain you any further on the issue at this preliminary stage. But I won't be able to support the motion.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion on the Warner motion? Senator Warner, would you like to close? The motion then is....does anyone want to hear it repeated, the motion repeated? The motion is the Warner motion. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: 34 ayes, 1 nay, Mr. President, on the motion to adopt Senator Warner's motion.

PRESIDENT: The motion carries on the Warner motion. The Chair recognizes Senator Lamb for an announcement.

SENATOR LAMB: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, just a brief announcement to alert the members of the Executive Board that we are planning to have a meeting of the Executive Board tomorrow afternoon probably upon adjournment. This will involve referencing of bills, the Chaplain situation and possibly some other business. But I would like to alert the members of the Executive Board to be free tomorrow afternoon probably upon adjournment for a meeting and that would be, Pat, in which room?

CLERK: 1520, Senator.

SENATOR LAMB: 1520. That is the Education hearing room, is it not?

CLERK: Yes, sir. Yes, sir.

PRESIDENT: Any other announcements, Mr. Clerk, before we are ready to adjourn?
