PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Lamb.

SENATOR LAMB: Mr. President, members, perhaps it would be easier for the members of the Executive Board if we would set a definite time to meet. We will meet under the North balcony here at eleven o'clock if that is satisfactory, the Executive Board under the North balcony at eleven o'clock only to reference bills. We need to do that before we adjourn so that it can be entered in the Journal and the bills can be printed over the weekend.

PRESIDENT: Senator Lamb, the Chair may observe that unless we get a lot more business here we may not be in session until eleven o'clock. So do you want to meet earlier than that if we get out of here earlier than that?

SENATOR LAMB: That suits me. I was under the impression we would be meeting longer but...

PRESIDENT: No, I don't think so (inaudible).

SENATOR LAMB: Well let's just say that the Executive Board members please stick around so that we can meet to reference these bills just as soon as you get them introduced here and Jack Rodgers has a chance to reference them. We would like to get that done as early as we can this morning.

PRESIDENT: Speaker Marvel, did you have anything additional?

SPEAKER MARVEL: I think that when we have the business processed on the Clerk's desk we simply can recess, take care of the Exec Board business and then come back in session.

SENATOR NICHOL: Mr. Chairman, I have a question that I would like to have you state and that is this. Since we have some bills now referenced, when is the earliest that we may set hearing dates or has that been discussed?

PRESIDENT: Mr. Speaker, could you answer that, the timing on the setting of hearings from the standpoint of the introduction today, let's say?
