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get ten, his subject of Veterans Affairs will get ten, and his subject of Military Affairs will get ten. So I believe we can solve part of this problem except for Senator Koch and I do feel sorry for Senator Koch, so I say let's leave it at ten for a year. Let's try it. Let's hold to these campaign promises and see what happens. Thank you, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay, Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I guess I would have to agree with Senator Warner. I would like to see us be able to put our name on as many bills as we would like and take the responsibility for those individual bills. Unfortunately, it has been determined by some process which is supposed to be magic that individual legislators should be limited to a certain number of bills. Senator Warner also says he would like to see the committee bills reduced to zero. I am not sure he means that the Appropriations Committee should be reduced to zero also because that would bring us to a screeching halt in short time, because I think most of those bills, if not all of them, come out of the Appropriations Committee bills. Now that puts me in a little bit of a dilemma because my good friend, Senator Warner, is in a special particular category all by himself with his committee. In addition to that, as I recall from twelve years experience the Appropriations Committee can kind of wallow all over the place and get into every area of the book, Government, Ag, Revenue and everything else. So they have got wide discretion. So actually, Senator Warner, you operate under one set of rules and all the other committees operate under another, but being the wise and successful legislator that you are I can understand that you knew all that before I began to speak. Now the question that really remains is, do we want committee bills? I really don't care. The Ag Committee did not hold a series of interim hearings all over the state. We didn't travel all over the state at great expense to determine whether or not the public wanted these bills or not, but I have in my desk here and down in the office more than a dozen bills that have been proffered to me, most of them Ag related. I have in addition to that another probably eight or ten bills that would also be categorized as committee bills, not one of which we solicited. I really don't care if we have a bill on hazardous waste this year. It makes no difference to me. There is some concern on the part of the Governor that we meet the criteria of the federal government with regard to the disposition of hazardous
