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interpreting it and as I say, I am a freshman senator so maybe I am wrong and then I have heard a lot of senators talk about we should be able to bite the bullet and not be afraid to put our own name on a bill. I'm not afraid to do that any time and I don't know why anybody would be afraid to as long as it is something they believe in but there are bills that my constituents might ask me to introduce that I don't believe in and I wouldn't want to introduce a bill and then have to vote against it but I think that my constituents have that right to be heard or to at least have a hearing. And then I wonder too about the senators that have been saying, I lost my train of thought for just a minute, the senators have been saying that we should have the courage to put our name to every bill and that all through their campaign all they heard from their constituents was that this body introduces too many bills. I heard that too during my campaign but my district must be different from the other forty-eight because all I heard from the people in my district was, this body introduces too many bills that raise our taxes or regulate our private lives or our businesses. I never heard one of my constituents complain about housekeeping bills or bills that didn't affect their pocketbook or their personal lives and I don't think that any of my constituents really realized the total number of bills that are introduced and the number that actually get to the floor and the number that are passed. So I would like to mention that that my constituency at least really doesn't care how many bills we introduce. What they care about is what bills increase their taxes or regulate their personal lives or their business and finally, I wouldn't put this in the way of a motion but a suggestion that you might want to think about because I know as a motion it would never pass but when you talk about biting the bullet and how many bills we should have introduced by committee and by individual senators, I laid awake last night thinking, how would it be if committees could introduce any kind of bills except tax raising bills or bills that regulate people's lives or businesses, only state senators should be allowed to introduce bills that raise taxes or regulate personal lives or businesses. I wonder if we had a rule like that, how that would be received by this body and I think really that is what we are saying that we use the committees to introduce those type of bills and perhaps that is cowardly. That is all I wanted to say and now anybody that wants to correct me and tell me where I have misunderstood this debate I would appreciate it because I have pretty much made up my mind how I am going to vote but if I have misunderstood, I would like to know it. Thank you, Mr. President.
