for us and only through science was it made possible and I agree with you that I would say to you that politics is a science. It may not always be exact but it will never be exact as long as we continue to gag people who have ideas and who wish to have them made public and who wish to have public debate and discussion. I realize where the final vote is. The final vote is on this floor. You have got to have twenty-five votes to be successful and sometimes more than that but for us to sit here and talk about other factors which strangle us, ninety days and sixty days, Senator Beutler I agree with you, I think in the twenty-first century we can no longer afford an artificial number of days in terms of doing business for the State of Nebraska. At one time that might have been true but in this age of technology and rapid change, there is no way that we expect to keep up with the business of this state by artificially limiting us in certain ways. I submit to you that one of the reasons that the power has ascended to the Potomac River is because we in legislatures have too long not placed before the people ideas that express justice and fairness either through lack of vision or from lack of courage. I am willing to take and accept all blame for the bills I introduce from the public and from my constituents but for me to sit here and have to play Russian roulette, which bills are introduced this time, which bills are carryover, I don't think is for the best interest of the State of Nebraska nor for myself and I am asking very seriously all of you here today to accept this amendment. I think it is time that this state says publicly, we are elected as legislators, our business is to legislate. Our business is to bring before the people of this state ideas and possible considerations for law. I ask you to accept this amendment. Thank you.
