introducing unlimited legislation is an authority you should not take lightly and I would trust if that remains in the rule, and I support that concept, that then we remember what is frequently said on that floor by those who have been here for some period of time, that self-restraint and self-discipline is the only real force that exists in this Legislature for respect of the public for how we conduct ourselves and conduct their matters. I would hope that each of us would acknowledge that responsibility and not misuse a privilege which I think we ought to have but not misuse it to the extent that it then becomes an issue where we have to reimpose limitations because of the action of what could be a few if that action is not used with care and thought. But with those comments, Mr. President, I move the committee authorization be reduced to eight.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The Clerk will read the amendment.

CLERK: (Read Warner amendment as found on page 130 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER MARVEL: Any further discussion? All those in favor of the Warner amendment as read vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Okay, Clerk, record the vote.

CLERK: 34 ayes, 6 nays on adoption of Senator Warner's proposal, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion carries. Are there other amendments?

CLERK: Yes, sir. Mr. President, Senator Warner now moves to... Strike it, Senator?

SENATOR WARNER: Let me think about that one a little bit, Pat.

CLERK: Okay. Mr. President, we are now on the Wesely... Mr. President, first of all if I may, Senator Lamb would like to have a meeting of the Executive Board at eleven-thirty underneath the North balcony for purposes of referencing bills, that is eleven-thirty, the Executive Board underneath the North balcony.

Mr. President, we now have the Wesely amendment as adopted before us, as amended, excuse me, the Wesely proposal as amended.
