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other. Another point that I have heard this morning and maybe I am...I realize perhaps I am a little naive in some respects and maybe I misunderstand my mission but I campaigned only on the basis that I would use good judgement in the Legislature, that I would represent my district but I don't believe I have any obligation to introduce every piece of legislation that every one of my constituents wants. I think that I was elected, expected to use good judgement and try to attempt to pass that legislation which I felt needed to be passed and which would be beneficial. I could not introduce a bill simply because someone wanted it if I couldn't support that bill and I don't intend to introduce a bill for any of my constituents that I can't get up on the floor and support. I don't know whether fifteen bills for a committee or eight bills or five or none or seventeen is a correct number. I would like to think that we could operate without limits but my observation has been that without limits we have entirely too much legislation to take care of and I think the rights of some of the rest of us are being denied when someone introduces bills indiscriminately for every interest and every constituent that he may have. I would personally feel that perhaps we ought to live with the rule that was adopted last year and give it a little bit more chance. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Cope.

SENATOR COPE: Mr. President, members, I would almost plead with you to reject this unlimited amount of bills. I guess for the new senators, let me tell you what has happened that is in my case the six years that I have been in the Legislature with a limitation. We spend most of the time debating, I won't call them trash bills like Senator Schmit did, but let's say not as important bills during the session because they are easy. We don't have to take a real tough stand and we can spend our time and fold our hands and say, gee, look how hard I am working and I'm doing a good job and all those things to our constituents and what do we do? We push back the major legislation that we should be dealing with first and we push it back until we push it back until the session is over. Now think what is going to happen if we have unlimited and think of the domination that there can be by a few people in the Legislature. If you think that has happened in the past, look what is going to happen in the future. I just can't believe that we are thinking about passing this kind of legislation this morning. Please consider it.
