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necessarily there will still be some of this kind of juggling but at least it does two things. It says every Senator has the right to identify one bill as a priority bill regardless of what the Speaker and others may think and every committee chairman can designate an additional two. So there is a sharing of power. The second important concept in the priority bill system is that it forces some early decision making. Under the concept, by the forty-fifth day in the long session and by the thirtieth day in the short session the Speaker will cut off the designation of priority bills and everyone will by that time have identified what the priority bills are. I think that this will have an advantage to us of allowing you and I to redirect our resources at the bills we know are going to be up before the Legislature, the bills we know we are going to be debating, and it will give us more chance to prepare adequately. I should also mention probably in light of the rule change that we just made with an unlimited number of bill introductions now, I think it is even more important that we have some sort of priority bill system. I think I will leave the introduction at that and I would be glad to answer questions with regard to how the system would work. While it is kind of a long rule but everything other than what I have talked about are primarily the mechanics of the rule. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Any further discussion? Okay, the motion is the adoption of...Senator Beutler, we are talking about the material that starts on page 27 and goes through page 28, is that correct?

SENATOR BEUTLER: That is correct, Mr. Speaker, with the exception that the dates have been changed in accordance with your suggestion, I believe, from the thirtieth to the forty-fifth day and from the twentieth to the thirtieth day, the cut off date.

SPEAKER MARVEL: All those in favor of the...Senator Wesely.

SENATOR WESELY: I guess, Mr. Speaker, I was going to arise in support of the Beutler rule change and I think it relates very well to the fact that we just lifted any limitation on individual bills by individual senators. It seems to me as a result we ought to have a system to set priorities that may be more functional than maybe we have in the past, may have started a little earlier than we have in the past. I think we have done a fairly good job with that but it might help to have those in the rules and more clearly defined for us. So at this time in the way it seems to have been presented, I will support the Beutler amendment to the rules.
