oftentimes has not followed this provision even when it is possible to follow it for a temporary designation of a person, the Speaker should be allowed to designate whoever he chooses as is the practice now, and if the rule is not going to be observed, and I don't see any reason for it to be observed anyway, then I think that this language should just be removed from the book. Here is the language that would be removed: "When possible the order for delegation of the presiding officer shall be as set forth in Section 6". The listing goes down, Chairman of the Legislative Council, Committee on Committees, Judiciary Government, and so forth, and that order is not followed. So we ought to just take this superfluous language out of the book.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Is there any further discussion? Senator Wesely, your light is on. Senator Wesely, do you wish to be recognized? Okay. No other lights on. The motion before the House is the adoption of the Chambers amendment to Rule 1. All those in favor of that motion vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted on this motion? Have you all voted? Clerk, record the vote.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 1 may, on adoption of Senator Chambers' motion, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Did you record the vote?

CLERK: Yes, sir.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Did you announce the vote?

CLERK: Yes, sir, I did.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay, the motion is carried and the amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Chambers now moves to amend Rule 2, Section 3(c), strike all the language contained therein. That is on page 9, Senator.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Yes. sir.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, I will read the language and I will explain why I think it should be stricken. The language to be stricken is the following: "The Governor, state officers, former legislators and other distinguished visitors may be admitted to the floor upon permission from the Chair". Now in the past the Governor and others from the Governor's office have simply taken access to the floor and when I
