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promised and campaigned on was less bills. We are behind you a hundred percent. I am sure we were late in talking about that. It should have been done when the bill came up, that part of it and for that I apologize. But I have learned in the four years that I have been down here that if you want to get something there are ways to do it by twisting and working the rules and we all have done it or will do it and I am not sure it is good and I am sure it drives the Speaker nuts but I think the time we are spending right now talking about this and trying to get it straightened out will be saved later on in the session, if not this session, the sessions to come. Because if the gate is left open for as many bills as some want introduced we won't even have time to have the hearings on them to say nothing of taking the time to debate them. So in a cool and calm and collected way I hope we can sit down this morning and settle this thing. I was part of the problem yesterday. If the vote goes against me today I will feel that I have done my part to my constituents and my state. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The Chair recognizes Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I wasn't here yesterday afternoon and if this continues, I will tell you one thing, I'm not going to be here this afternoon. I am going to go home and chase those cows, Senator Chambers. I've got cattle to move and I've got grain to move and I've got other responsibilities that are going to take precedence over what I consider to be a bunch of nitpicking. We explained several times and I know that I appreciate and admire Senator Kahle for taking the blame because oftentimes around this place blame is misplaced. I would just like to say I understand Senator John DeCamp was blamed yesterday for the other side. I don't think John even knew what was going on but Johnny is inclined to take the credit so many times for things he is not responsible for that he has got to take the blame from time to time for things he is not responsible for and I am going to tell this story because if I don't he is going to tell it and I told it to him this morning. I didn't really authorize the whole thing but I modified it. People back in Bellevue, Nebraska, don't really care how much hay or the quality of the hay that goes into the cow. It is what comes out that they worry about and I think it is high time that we worry more about the end product than the in product and so many times, and I think Senator Chambers has said it. Senator Marge Higgins said it the other day in her maiden speech, that there is a lot more damage done by what comes in than what comes out than what goes in and my good friend,
