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He is known as the point man, the stalking horse, the lightning rod that draws the flak, that pulls people out of the woodwork, that helps to sharpen and define the issues. Then a point is reached where some people like Senator Barrett can no longer be silent or they will burst assunder. They well so full and they have to speak and before you know it the senators, those who speak well, those who speak maybe not so well, are nevertheless standing on the floor and expressing a point of view which is what we are supposed to do. I enjoy the legislative process most when I see the pulling and the tugging and the stripping away of the sham togetherness. If we don't ever get down to the point where people are honestly saying what is in their mind, we will never resolve the issue because the true issue is never before us. Now the word compromise is mentioned around here but I think we also talk about the word negotiation and people confuse the two. Some people think of compromise in the sense that Senator DeCamp was trying to lay out where Side A has a position, Side B has a position and neither can prevail so like the English they give a little bit to each side and nobody is satisfied when it is over but something is done and you can move forward. To other people it goes like this, and I have mentioned it before. I sit down with a dozen eggs. You sit down with a dozen eggs. We negotiate until you have two dozen eggs and I have none. Then you say, I like that, and come back when you want to negotiate or compromise some more. Well everybody wants to get something but what is it that is really wanted? Are the senators concerned about too many bills or are they concerned about what they say a few people in their district have told them? They keep saying the people are saying, too many bills. Maybe one or two or three people have said it. That is not all the people in Nebraska and our job is to evaluate and make judgements and if the people without the information that we have come to a conclusion which is not valid based on all the information, we have to explain to them that they have a right to express their opinion, we take it into consideration but our decision is on the other side of the question. That is what we are here for. We have to set an example. Leadership does not mean that you are merely an echo of what everybody tells you to do because you could not do that anyway. You have to get the information, evaluate it, take your position and be willing to pay the freight for it. So I think the discussion has its value, not because of what we have talked about in terms of rules because people like Senator DeCamp and like myself can do anything we want to do. I can drive DeCamp to distraction when he has everybody else on his side. I can never get everybody on my side.
