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to the introducers or the sponsors of the bill, fourteen or fifteen or twenty of them. But I can guarantee I know something about the bill. I know something about each one of them. I guarantee you without ever having talked to them, I know not one of them received a request from Falstaff to change this law. I guarantee you I know that. I have been offering to work this out with Falstaff for a long time and as recently as 9:30 yesterday morning, a.m. Falstaff specifically said, no way, no way, we don't need a change in the law, we don't want that law changed. I kind of hinted to them that I thought maybe that their motives were less than totally pure and did recite a few sections of the Internal Revenue Code that do allow a feller to write off a business, maybe a hundred percent in one year, if he is forced out of business let's say by some action of law or government. And I think that is a legitimate question that we ought to be asking ourselves whether that is involved. But what the bill will do will flush out the whole picture. But I am sure the bill in its present form cannot pass because I don't think with the opposition that would develop in its present form from such people as Schlitz and Coors and Pabst and so on and so forth, and it's going to develop you will soon see, in the form it is now, that the bill could get seven votes. But I believe it will bring to a head this issue, and to Senator Chambers who says we are all leaping and doing whatever because of some private industry wanting something, I would say, pick an issue in here...there are 500 of them up there, 600 now maybe, almost every one of them is before us because some individual, some group, some business, some government agency, found some problem or some need for a change. That is the whole essence of why we are here, to look at the problems as they develop, make legislative changes if needed, and that is what we are going to do here. We are going to introduce a bill that looks at the question in one specific area of liquor laws on giving of gifts or something of value in the use of plain label beer. Certainly a proper subject for us to look at, and if we are stampeded into it because some business highlighted the issue, so what. We are simply doing our job. So I urge you to support the introduction of the bill, and I am sure we will all be learning a lot, lot more here in the next 24 to 48 hours on who might or might not own Falstaff or be owning it, what the need of amendments to the bill are, so on and so forth.
