I think Senator Nichol and Senator De Camp probably unfortunately hit the nail on the head, and I support the introduction of this bill for the same reasons. I also support the introduction of this bill because it could possibly save 170 jobs, 170 families. I think we need to all keep that in mind. This law has been on the books since 1937 and it's...when prohibition was probably fresh in the minds of all of us, and I think it's obsolete. Now Iowa has done away with this, and Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Colorado, all permit private label beer. So not only are our statutes antiquated but I also agree that we will probably find out a lot more about this issue if the introduction of this bill is allowed. I would urge your support not only for that reason, not only to bring things a little more clearly into focus, but also because there is a great possibility and I am hopeful that we can save 170 jobs in South Omaha. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Maresh.

SENATOR MARESH: Mr. Speaker, I have volumes of material that was mail going between Mr. Kalmanovitz and the Governor and the Liquor Commission way back a year ago. And I think he was asking that Nebraska look at its laws and we didn't. I spoke to a couple of the Omaha senators at that time and they didn't seem to be too concerned about the problem and talked to one of the Liquor Commissioners. He said, well they are carrying out the law and I wondered why we couldn't change the law. I think it is going to be a good law if we do change it. Why shouldn't we have plain labeled beer and allow quantity discounts just like any other commodity, groceries. You see plain labeled groceries in the grocery store cheaper than those that are known brands, and I can see that it is going to help the consumer to have a discount for large quantities and for plain labeled beer. So I think we should change our old law and put this on the books just like the other states have. So I will support the introduction of this bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Kahle.

SENATOR KAHLE: Mr. Speaker and members, I haven't tried this mike today yet so I thought I would see if it was working and then Senator Maresh beat me to it. I, too, have thought for a long time that Falstaff was pleading for help through the Liquor Commission and through...I don't know whether they ever cooperated with the city officials perhaps like they should have but I think Omaha was too busy trying to get Cummin's case to worry about
