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Falstaff, and I think this is a good lesson for all of us. We are always looking for that green grass over the fence and we're not protecting our...we're not looking after our own back door, our own turf. Thank you. And this is a good example of it. We want to get the big thing and we forgot and let the little one get away. I, too, am concerned and I can't really understand how Senator Chambers can object to this situation. He is always talking about the low job opportunities in Omaha and how people can't find a job. There is going to be 170 more looking for a job the way it looks if Falstaff closes. And unless a miracle happens, it's going to close, and even if the star of the west should succeed, as he says, then there are probably going to have to be some changes made before we can get Falstaff to come and stay. I see no harm in the introduction of the bill. It doesn't take much to do away with it if we don't need it. Perhaps this is exactly what our people out in California need is the word that the Legislature has taken action and is intending to do something about it. Maybe that will be the crucial thing when it comes right down to it. Remember they are two hours later than we are and perhaps they are still negotiating out there. I don't think it would be all that bad to have beer made in Omaha out of the sky blue water out of the Missouri River. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Before we go to the next individual, underneath the south balcony there is a guest of Senator Wesely, Captain Edward J. Minard, Professor of ROTC at the University of Nebraska. Where are you, sir? Are you there? Senator Hoagland. The question has been called for. Do I see five hands? Shall debate cease? All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Record the vote.

CLERK: 29 ayes, 1 nay to cease debate, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Debate is ceased. Senator Wiitala, do you wish to close on your motion?

SENATOR WIITALA: Mr. Speaker and members of the body, I feel that this bill is very important. I would hate to leave a false impression that if Falstaff so decides to leave the state, that we as legislators didn't do everything in our power to clarify the law, making it more consistent with the original intent of the state's present laws. I believe it is important to clarify the law irrespective of the issue in Omaha. As things now stand, there is only one brewery in the state, and if there were several more of them, I will assure you that
