PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Vickers.

SENATOR VICKERS: Mr. President, members, I wonder if Senator Wagner or Senator Schmit would respond to a question please.

PRESIDENT: Senator Wagner, will you respond.

SENATOR VICKERS: Senator Wagner, in the bill on page 9 it indicates that individuals licensed as milk haulers under the Nebraska Pasteurized Milk Law and I think that is the law that we passed last year, if I remember correctly, shall not require to be licensed as a bulk milk hauler. How do they determine the difference between a milk hauler and a bulk milk hauler? Could you explain a little bit about that?

SENATOR WAGNER: The bulk hauler?

SENATOR VICKERS: The difference between a milk hauler, an individual licensed as a milk hauler under the Nebraska Pasteurized Milk Law as opposed to a bulk milk hauler which does require a license under this bill.

SENATOR WAGNER: Senator Vickers, maybe Senator Schmit... could I transfer this to him, Senator Vickers?

SENATOR VICKERS: Yes, that is fine. I am sure there is a reason for that. I am just curious as to what it is.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Yes, Senator, these people collect the milk. They are merely engaged in the process of transportation and have not...do not have any responsibility except to transport it under certain conditions that are specified by the Department of Agriculture and it was felt that it was not necessary to expect that requirement of them.

SENATOR VICKERS: But they are licensed under the Nebraska Pasteurized Milk Law that we passed last year. Is that correct?

SENATOR SCHMIT: They were at that time, yes.

SENATOR VICKERS: Well as it indicates in the bill it says that individuals licensed as milk haulers under the Nebraska Pasteurized Milk Law shall not be required to be licensed or pay fees as and then it goes ahead and gives some other things, or bulk milk haulers, and I am just wondering what is the difference between a bulk milk hauler and a licensed milk hauler.
