SENATOR CLARK: Well you don't have to do that because there is no other lights on.

SENATOR KOCH: Well I thought Senator DeCamp was going to talk again.

SENATOR CLARK: No, Senator DeCamp does not want to talk.

SENATOR KOCH: Okay, thank you.

SENATOR CLARK: The question before the House is the adoption of the Schmit amendments. All those in favor vote aye. All those opposed vote nay.

CLERK: Senator Clark voting aye.

SENATOR CLARK: Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 7 mays on the motion to adopt Senator Schmit's amendment.

SENATOR CLARK: The motion carried. The amendments are adopted.

CLERK: I have nothing further on the bill, Mr. President.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator DeCamp, what do you want to do with the bill?

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President, I want to make something very clear so that there is no misunderstanding. The Schmit amendment embodies those concepts that I said we could add to the basic concept of valuation. That is a termination date, three years hence. That is more emphasis right now at least, on a particular type of land, agricultural land, to even out the peaks and valleys but I have publicly committed and let there be no mistake, I have told Senator Schmit this, that on Select File I am going to support and will work with some others in the room including Senator Beyer if he wants to join me in offering the alternate proposal for the second and third years. Understand why though I am suggesting this. The pain has really hit a number of subdivisions the first year and so there is no use the first year giving, and I use the word "windfall", when the damage is elsewhere. The second year they can plan for it and we can offer more money to them and the third year, 90/10 or whatever, we should have equalization accomplished and it really doesn't make any difference. I have computed rather quickly and I think some others have and verified this. Sarpy County for example, with the formula, little variables that will be offered on Select File, over the three year life would actually gain more money than they would if we stuck with my bill in its original form, which I think I could be happy with, but Sarpy County, rather than getting it all the first year will get most of it the second and the third
