Why...this wasn't even part of the hearing. Normally there are people on this floor that would jump up and say, hey we can't do this because we didn't have a public hearing on this issue, but those same people are supporting it now. I don't believe that the people of this state only want one license plate. If they do want one license plate I think they want to pay half as much for it. That is the only way that I will support this issue. If we are going to do it for dollars then let's put one plate on the back. Let's just paint the blooming thing and lets sell it to them for half price. Otherwise, if we are going to keep their prices the same as they are let's give them both plates. Out in rural Nebraska that back plate gets so bend up, battered up and beat up and not having to go six or seven years to do it either, that maybe the stickers on the windshield would be the best idea in the long run.
