each one will do. I hope this information is helpful to vou but it is for informational purposes. I would suggest to you that the figures that you have in these two different documents are using only \$70,000,000 so that your comparison is made on the same level. I have had on my desk this morning a note from Senator Chambers and I can understand his concern. however, to answer Senator Chambers, if I may, Mr: President, this subject matter of \$70,000,000 was of prime importance to each and every one of us here and I have made the suggestion along with others that we no longer play around an hour today, set it for an hour day after tomorrow but let's get this settled on the floor and stay with it until we do. There are areas in the state that need this money badly, had depended upon it, and it is high time we asserted ourselves and took that action and guit stalling and I know there is differences of opinion but let's try to work together and get this put out. I am going to support either one or both of these until we see where the strength is and where those thirty-three votes are. that is what I am going to support. Getting the money out to them is the prime example. We want to do it as equitably as we can but knowing full well that everybody is not going to be completely satisfied, I want you to look at the state as a whole, not only to your legislative district. It is our responsibility and duty I suggest to you this morning, that we quit looking at pride, authorship and whatever else may be involved and think about the people in the state and the subdivisions that need this money and let's get it out to them. Look at these sheets that we have passed out to you, look at them in total, not only your own district and make your decision. Thank you, Mr. President,
