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SPEAKER MARVEL: That isn't what you really meant when you said that and I tread on dangerous ground when I am trying to determine ahead of time what you really mean. But let me say this. The change in the agenda was due to the fact that one of those who was basically interested requested that the process be accelerated. I think that I made a mistake, and I make honest mistakes. I hope that they are considered honest mistakes because I have no interest basically in either one of those bills as to the outcome. There are people in here who do. The only thing that I was trying to do was to, and I think that this is in the rules, or the unwritten rules of the speakership and that is that when one who has worked on a particular piece of legislation who comes and asks for some change, if that individual has worked on and is not out here in left field someplace I think that it is incumbent upon us to at least listen to whatever the request is. Now, does anybody else have any questions? Senator Goodrich. Senator Chambers, you will never find me objecting to the fact that you are puzzled by something that I do or about to do and call it to anybody's attention. That is your privilege. I wouldn't want to take that away from you. Senator Goodrich.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Mr. President, I noticed in a memo that came around that tomorrow for at least a three hour period and sometimes that develops into four or five hours they are going to have the electricity shut off for this half of the floor of the Capitol building. Has that been taken into consideration or has it been changed or something?

SPEAKER MARVEL: The time that you refer to is 7:00 at night.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Okay, fine.

SPEAKER MARVEL: As far as the agenda tomorrow is concerned, there will be time over the noon hour, since I understand that there are at least eight of you that have a noon engagement, but we will try to. . . we won't have any problem with the heat as far as that is concerned. There is enough heat around the place anyway. Anybody else have any questions? Senator Higgins.

SENATOR HIGGINS: Mr. Speaker, do the rules of the Legislature say that the Speaker can change the agenda whenever he chooses?

SPEAKER MARVEL: Yes.

SENATOR HIGGINS: He could do it just come in here in the morning and say I have changed the agenda without printing a new one and
