Now, as I understand it, you want to reputeiate that and go essentially to a population or random formula. I say population or random because it is simply the amount of dollars targeted into a particular thing. All you have to do to change that is target those dollars into houses, where you have only got one million and target them out of one of the other areas, such as the agricultural land.

SENATOR CLARK PRESIDING

SENATOR CLARK: You have about thirty seconds.

SENATOR DeCAMP: I have suggested to you that this was a permanent solution. Not a forever solution as my very good friend Senator Schmit said. I said a permanent solution and I think that it is. So, I would urge you to leave the bill the way it is where it best deal with the formula there and not accept or adopt the amendment.

SENATOR CLARK: Howard Peterson.

SENATOR H. PETERSON: Mr. Chairman, I would call the question. I believe that we have all looked at this enough and we could make our decision.

SENATOR CLARK: Is there any objection to calling the question? Senator Lamb.

SENATOR LAMB: I would just like to say a couple of things, a couple of minutes if I could.

SENATOR CLARK: Do you think it has been debated enough?

SENATOR LAMB: Well, we have had two speakers, I don't know if that is enough or not.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Kremer.

SENATOR KREMER: Mr. Chairman, I have not spoken on this issue. I had my light on and perhaps I should have before. Just because I haven't doesn't mean at all that I did not have an interest. I have been watching the various proposals that have been brought before us and I have reached a conclusion. That is why I signed the amendment that is before us now. I would hope that I would get an opportunity for the first time to talk on this issue.
