for the approximately \$70 million we may have here, and I know Senator Dworak may take an exception to it, but I think it would be a little bit easier going back home and telling some of the people we did put in kind of a token amount to take care of some of those political subdivisions that did borrow from the government... did borrow to keep themselves going, and this amendment is offered in good faith. I talked to a good many of you. I have a concern. I think some amount ought to be put in there, and I think \$500,000 is a reasonable one. There has been considerable discussion on it. I hope you will support it. It is not to harrass anybody or anything like this to the bill. I hope we could adopt it. Whatever happens, I will still support the bill. Thank you.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Stoney.

SENATOR STONEY: Question.

SENATOR CLARK: The question has been called for. Do I see five hands? I do. The question is to cease debate. All those in favor vote aye, aga'nst vote no. Senator Dworak, for what reason do you arise?

SENATOR DWORAK: I have no reason to arise right now. I am hoping this will fail and then I can talk on it.

SENATOR CLARK: Record the vote.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 8 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

SENATOR CLARK: Debate is ceased. Senator Wagner.

SENATOR WAGNER: I just hope we get a favorable vote on this, and let's do it quickly.

SENATOR CLARK: The question is the adoption of the Wagner amendment. All those in favor vote aye. All those opposed vote nay. Have you all voted? Voting aye, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Senator Clark voting aye.

SENATOR CLARK: Have you all voted? Once more, have you all voted? Senator Wagner.

SENATOR WAGNER: Call of the House and a roll call vote.

SENATOR CLARK: Those in favor of a Call of the House vote aye, opposed no. Record the vote.
