SENATOR WAGNER: No, I think we are talking about two different things here, Dave, on...is that on page 5?

SENATOR LANDIS: You asked about campaign literature.

SENATOR WAGNER: Yes. Now on page 5, on that line 23 there is an exception.

SENATOR LANDIS: Oh.

SENATOR WAGNER: Yes, the exception is you know, it is an exclusion of office supplies and campaign literature. My question is, does, because when you are in some of these campaigns you do have signs, and does campaign literature include signs?

SENATOR LANDIS: No, for that purpose I don't believe they do.

SENATOR WAGNER: Okay, now I really think then what I would like to do then is just offer an amendment and we would include signs because these are some of the things, you get into a campaign and I think they ought to be exempted...exception to it.

SENATOR LANDIS: Well let me just say that the interpretation of that language will be subject to the legislative history which is determined by what the introducers say on the floor of the Legislature that it means and your purpose of the question and my answer just meant that we cleared up that ambiguity and that signs are campaign literature for the purposes of line 23, page 5.

SENATOR WAGNER: Okay, now for the matter of record, if that is in there and we made it a matter of record, 1f signs are that, I won't add an amendment. It is a matter of record then.

SENATOR LANDIS: I would think that \dots let me just defer to another cointroducer and I am sure he will acknowledge the same thing.

SENATOR WAGNER: All right, because I don't want to have this left up to somebody else to make the determination. Either we make it here or just add an amendment and stick the word in there. I would really, Senator Landis, if you really don't mind, I would just as soon put the signs in there.

SENATOR LANDIS: Perhaps we can do it at Select File. We certainly would agree to that.
