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then the only way you can go at it is to make a motion to substitute.

SENATOR NEWELL: Well, let me ask a question of the Chair. I think if I am correct Senator Warner was really asking for a ruling of the Chair. Is that correct or not, Senator?

SENATOR WARNER: That is correct.

PRESIDENT: All right.

SENATOR NEWELL: I think his point is a very simple one that it has traditionally been done and Senator DeCamp is trying to make a point here which may set a precedent. It's a point that probably ought not...I mean, I don't know that it's all that significant and I guess a ruling is what we are asking for now.

PRESIDENT: As I understand it, your....both of your motions were filed, were on the Clerk's desk and have been printed in the Journal. So presumably everyone has had an opportunity to read both of them. You had yours on line first so as I see it it makes little difference which one comes up first from the Chair's standpoint because I am neutral in this matter. You can take either one of them up as far as I am concerned, but there is an objection and so I would rule, Senator Warner, that it is in order since he had this on file, because it has been... we have been allowing substitutions rather freely.

SENATOR WARNER: That is all I....I would withdraw my objection, Mr. President, but I did want to raise the issue...

PRESIDENT: All right, you made the point.

SENATOR WARNER:at a pertinent time.

PRESIDENT: Thank you, Senator Warner. So let's proceed then, Senator Newell, with your....(interruption).

CLERK: Mr. President, if I may, Senator Newell....

PRESIDENT: Just a moment, Senator Carsten, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR CARSTEN: Mr. President, and members of the Legislature, I guess my only question, and it relates to our procedure and our subsequent action here on the floor, was were both of these amendments submitted to the Clerk at the same time or were they at different intervals, and,
