which will not disrupt the subdivisions very much, which will disrupt them less than any other formula you can devise, you would go with the proposal Senator DeCamp has offered you and then hope that the 284 provision will be tested in the court and will be found constitutional. In the intervening time with that kind of evidence. I am sure the Revenue Committee will take another long look at this issue. We have to remember, in defense of myself, Senator Chambers, on the 882 situation, the Legislature began a long while before most of us were in this body, almost before Senator Marvel was here, to send money back to the subdivisions. We started out with one small amount and then we came with another and another and another, and we have been doing that for a period of years. What we started out a long while ago has now become a major supporting effort of local government and as Senator Warner has pointed out, it has almost become an overriding concern of the state government. I think that it is entirely fitting and is certainly almost mandatory that we find a better system for the allocation and distribution of all of these various funds, recognizing as I did when I introduced 524 that the population factor is going to be a major factor in dispersal of funds in future years. I don't think any of us in this body who are realistic will deny that. I think we can continue to face the issue on the

PRESIDENT: Half a minute, Senator.

SENATOR SCHMIT:floor for another 20 days if we wish, but we are not going to make that much of a change. I lost the issue the last time it was decided. I may lose again, but I believe that the formula which you have here before you today offers an alternative which is reasonable and which will give those of you who supported the valuation distribution proposal a reasonable opportunity to find out if it is constitutional and if so we can proceed in that area. I ask you to support the proposal.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Kahle.

SENATOR KAHLE: Mr. Chairman, I call for the question.

PRESIDENT: All right, the question has been called for. Do I see five hands? I do. The question is, shall debate? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record the vote.
