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and shoulders above everyone else. Now I recognize they are all nice guys and they are all honest people, but I don't know a dishonest person in this body, and yet we all drag our tail up to the whatever floor it is and file our accountability reports as is required by law. I am going to ask you something else. Go back home and ask your people if they think that the attorney should operate under a different set of rules than the insurance agent, or the banker or the business man. I think they will say no. I believe the public would be amazed to know that attorneys have privileges under this law that no other profession has. I am asking Senator Beutler for the names, for how you treated your people, for what you defended them on, I am asking for their source of income.

SENATOR NICHOL: One minute.

SENATOR SCHMIT: If I have to reveal it, I am saying that some of the Senators who are attorneys should reveal it. I see nothing wrong with that. I don't think the body sees anything wrong with it. I try not to be personal about it...(interruption).

SENATOR NICHOL: Excuse me, Senator Schmit. Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Thank you, Mr. President, I am finished.

SENATOR NICHOL: For what reason do you rise, Senator Beutler?

SENATOR BEUTLER: I think this body and those who speak in front of this body have an obligation to the truth. Attorneys do not have any privileges under this law....

SENATOR NICHOL: Do you rise for a point of personal privilege? He was closing.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Attorneys do not have any privileges that anybody else has.

SENATOR NICHOL: Pat.

SENATOR BEUTLER: And I believe if somebody just looked at the statute, Mr. Chairman, they would see that. Thank you.

SENATOR NICHOL: Senator Beutler. Senator Schmit has closed so the situation before the Legislature is, shall
