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and I am sure they would be proud to have their name listed. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President, just very quickly, I oppose the amendment. We are at the very heart of the whole sunshine issue now and it was in the beginning when we first dealt with this, the double standard issue. If Mutual of Omaha provides some people to go out and pass leaflets out or do anything for Larry Stoney, they have to record the names, the hours, the whole works, but if a teachers' group, for example, a labor union, for example, through whatever methods they utilize, mobilize a large amount of people to go and work and work and work, they don't record anything. Now don't kid yourself, labor, people doing work is the same as money. I can give somebody a \$100 or I can give them 20 or 30 hours of good hard, sincere labor. If the standard of reporting who donated a \$100 is good, then the standard of who donated a \$100 worth of work is good, and that is why the Schmit amendment makes eminent sense. That is why for the first time you might have an accountability law that, at least, on disclosure which was the original purpose would be somewhat honest. If the Schmit amendment goes on, I, for one, would be happy to have my name on this bill because it begins to do something in terms of disclosure. It discloses who does what in a campaign and that is what everybody who supported sunshine said it was all about, disclosure, information on who is supporting whom. That's all the amendment does and it does it well. So I oppose Senator Wiitala, which guts Senator Schmit's amendment, and I urge you to support the Schmit amendment.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: I would have to oppose Senator Wiitala's amendment. I think the reasons have been identified rather clearly. I just want to point out that it isn't only teachers and labor organizations that can put together groups. The Farm Bureau and the Farmers Union and the Livestock Feeders all of whom support me, they don't maybe have quite as tightly knit a group but they can get to be pretty parochial if they choose to do so, and I think that we ought to look at the whole picture and that is part of it and it is going to become more of a part of it I think in the future. So I would have to oppose Senator Wiitala's amendment very regretfully.
