Suppose a lobbyist takes me back to my district to a meeting? Justin King took me to a schoolboard meeting in my district a couple of months ago or so, and would he have to report that in that case, or not?

SENATOR NICHOL: Well, I believe the Accountability Commission has said that if it is of \$25 of value or more.

SENATOR MARESH: Well, this would be because it was probably a couple hundred miles round trip.

SENATOR NICHOL: In my opinion, Senator Maresh, I don't think it would be because it would be for both of your purpose rather than just yours.

SENATOR MARESH: That's what I wanted to find out for, you know, legislative intent, this would not have to be reported then, correct? If it was for both of our benefits and he was going there regardless if I was going or not?

SENATOR NICHOL: Well, you are talking about my amendment or the amendment to the amendment?

SENATOR MARESH: The bill itself, I mean your amendment itself. Would you think it was for my benefit or was it for both of our benefit? Then would he have to report it or not?

SENATOR NICHOL: If you are just doing it once, I would... it would be my opinion that you would not have to do that if it was just one time. I would have to check that out for sure, Senator Maresh, legally to see if it would or wouldn't. If you would wait just a minute, maybe I could get that for you.

SENATOR MARESH: Okay, thank you.

SENATOR NICHOL: And I will either bring it to you or on the floor, either way.

SENATOR MARESH: Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Labedz.

SENATOR LABEDZ: I would like to ask Senator DeCamp a question. Well, Senator DeCamp is not here so maybe I can ask the question of Senator Nichol. Oh, Senator John, you mentioned the fact that it was my duty to be here as
