SENATOR MARSH: Mr. Speaker, all of a sudden I like Senator Dworak's amendment and I do not wish to support an amendment to that section. I think it will eventually be removed because it would cripple some of the Right to Life persons and it is really not Right to Life, it is anti-choice.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator DeCamp, do you wish to close on your amendment?

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President, rest assured I can live under any of these laws you create. I got involved in this and as I told Senator Beutler and Senator Wesely, once the one amendment was adopted I would try to make the bill as effective and honest and workable as possible. That's all I am trying to do. I do note a sign both from out in the rotunda and from within the halls that the former supporters of the bill have now kind of determined that maybe they don't want all this accountability and disclosure and I think they are trying to kill it with kindness, whereas a few hours ago they were accusing us of doing that. The bill just ain't that bad as it is right now if you straighten this out, and I've got a funny feeling nobody really wants this bill to move today. But I am going to offer this amendment and I think it is reasonable and I think the bill still is in pretty good shape.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay, the motion is to adopt the DeCamp amendment. All those in favor of that motion vote aye, opposed vote no. No, this is the adoption of the DeCamp amendment. Have you all voted on the amendment? Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Well, Mr. President, the temptation is indeed not to press to try to get the thing passed and sabotage the bill, but I am not going to do her. I am going to try to get the bill in pretty decent form and for that reason I suggest that we have a Call of the House and take call in votes. There may be three people that still believe in what we are doing which is true accountability and making it function kind of half way efficiently, so I would ask for a Call of the House and take call ins and see what happens.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay, shall the House go under Call? All those in favor of that motion vote aye, opposed vote no. Record.
