as a delaying tactic and if truthfully you feel that way, then give them the 30 votes to do it on an individual basis. Secondly, just in case you are in the mood to pass something like this, I am going to make one more suggestion, and that is that the proposition before you conform to what the committee has said with regard...the Rules Committee has said with regard to what this rule should be, and that is simply that it shall lay over for a day unless the introducer objects. And I think there is an important distinction there in some cases. So I would move to amend the motion to provide that it shall lay over for a day unless the introducer of the bill objects. And I so move, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER MARVEL PRESIDING

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Dworak.

SENATOR DWORAK: Mr. President and colleagues, I agree a hundred percent with Senator Beutler in the fact that if we have a specific piece of legislation that is being badgered because of kill motions or some other maneuvering in that way, we can have a vote. If we have 30 votes we can suspend the rules on that particular piece of legislation. If that has that much strength, if it has that much importance, then we can vote on each issue with the 30 votes and not be hampered by the delay or the carry-over. But to blanket do this seems to be watering down the system where we can come in with some particular measure and facilitate passage of that measure when, in fact, it doesn't have the strength that was envisioned by the rule in the first place. So, I strongly oppose to a blanket changing of rules. I think we have a legitimate safety valve, if we want to suspend the rules on a particular or on a particular issue, we can do that. We have that flexibility. There is no sense, there is no reason and there is no compulsion to blanket or have an omnibus approach to changing the rules we have lived with for 84 days of this session. If the rule is right for 84 days, it is right for the last 6 days. And I very strongly oppose changing our rules in the middle of the ball game.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, in England they once had a person called the keeper of the rolls and there still may be such a person. Here there are some Senators who are keeper of the rules. Senator Beutler is in the forefront, and I agree with him. I agree with Senator Dworak. We have been in the Legislature long enough. Some of you are new...this is your first time around, but get used to this being what happens at the end of the
