SENATOR HABERMAN: All right. Now it will take 30 votes also to do what you are proposing. Is that correct? Or 25?

SENATOR WESELY: That's right, 30 votes to suspend the rules.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Now if we approve what you are doing, if there is a kill motion put on a bill....

SENATOR WESELY: Yes.

SENATOR HABERMAN: ...then the kill motion of that bill will come up at the same time the bill does, and you vote up the kill or vote the kill down....

SENATOR WESELY: That's right.

SENATOR HABERMAN:and then go on with the bill if it isn't killed.

SENATOR WESELY: Right. That's my interpretation, if you come up with any other amendment or process...(interruption).

SENATOR HABERMAN: Did we do this last year?

SENATOR WESELY: No, I don't think so.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Did we do it the year before?

SENATOR WESELY: No. But we haven't had the problem before. We used to do it that way, but then they kept killing bills on people and they didn't suspect it. That's why the rule change came in.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Thank you, Senator Wesely, and thank you, Mr. President.
