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to us that he intended to veto, you know, and let something hang and we go home tonight then there may be other actions that we did not understand? I want an official action from the Chair or from the Speaker so that I don't go away from here having been mislead.

SENATOR CLARK: Well, maybe the Speaker can advise you on that, I certainly don't know. As far as I know, we have had the vetoes back.

SENATOR KOCH: Well, maybe the liaison man, Mr. Habib, Senator Lamb...Senator Lamb, could you answer it, because obviously you are the liaison to the Governor to try to work this all out?

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Lamb. Senator liaison Lamb.

SENATOR LAMB: What's the question?

SENATOR CLARK: Would you restate your question to Senator Lamb, please?

SENATOR KOCH: Thank you. The question, Senator Lamb, is when you went to the Governor about coming back today or waiting until a week from this day, were you advised that the Governor would send all vetoes back to us today that he intended to veto?

SENATOR LAMB: The agreement with the Governor was that all bills passed on Final Reading yesterday would be... if he was going to veto them, he would veto them in time to get them back over here so we could act on them today. There was no commitment as to the bills which were passed on Final Reading today.

SENATOR KOCH: But how come we have had vetoes coming back today?

SENATOR LAMB: Vetoes....(interruption).

SENATOR KOCH: There is a nasty rumor floating around outside that there will be other vetoes that won't get back to us today, and I just want the record to be very clear, and I want to know how many other people in here understood like I understood that all bills would come back to us, if we came back today, that he intended to veto and give us a chance to exercise our prerogatives.

SENATOR LAMB: All the bills...all the bills that... (interruption).
